Who was Mother Cabrini?

A tiny powerhouse of a saint, Mother Cabrini came to the U.S. n 1889 to tend to the needs of Italian immigrants struggling in deep poverty. Practical, resourceful and above all faithful, she founded 67 schools, hospitals, and orphanages in a mere 34 years. She is the patron saint of immigrants.

Mother Cabrini faced many of the same problems young people have today. She grappled with fear, loss, prejudice, illness, and a society with huge disparities in wealth. Her inspiring life offers you an example of how to pull closer to the Sacred Heart of Jesus in the midst of challenges.
